Please describe a summary of work undertaken by the SAC to improve student achievement and school performance.

During each SAC meeting we examined school-wide data, in relation to our SSP goals. We had ongoing dialogue that described how the data informed the action steps of our SSP plan, resources necessary to implement our initiatives and ongoing data that was collected to monitor the progress of our actions.

The SAC offered us additional information by providing us with their perspectives on student interests, strengths, challenges, and learning. They offered suggestions in relation to reading, well-being, math goals and action steps, asked questions they were receiving from the community and helped us better develop ways that family and community could be involved in supporting their children in and outside of school.

We looked at the guiding principles of the Inclusive Education Policy and how this document works in conjunction with the African Nova Scotian Education Framework and the Treaty Education Framework. We examined the Provincial Code of Conduct and the 4 Pillars of Equity and then reviewed the new version of this document. All these documents were explored through the lens of school programming and student well-being. We discussed action steps specifically targeted towards diminishing the occurrence of attacks on student identity and ensuring the safe and equitable

treatment of all students. We worked with school community and families to find representation within our diverse school community to highlight to students how their contributions enrich our local community. We are continuing to investigate ways to promote more diverse membership on Seaside's SAC so that the SAC can more fully represent our school population and community. The SAC worked collaboratively to include community voice in our identified core values, school vision statement and School-Wide Matrix of Expectations.

We regularly discussed how to allocate funds to improve student achievement and well-being. A variety of different resources were purchased. SAC funds were spent on writing and reading teacher resources for instruction and assessment, materials for small group instruction in both math and literacy, interactive educational games, resources to support students' understanding of diversity and equity and high interest texts that were representative of our student population to promote engagement. As a group, we worked together to find solutions for school and community challenges. We explored various ways to help encourage new members to join SAC to fill any vacant seats.

Another focus for our SAC throughout the year was building connection between home, school, and community. SAC members and many families expressed interest in creating a PTO last year. We continued to have a PTO throughout this school year to support community engagement and provide celebratory events for students to further positive relationships between families, students, and school.

We continued to increase school, family and community alliances through ongoing collaboration and communication that enabled families and community to work in partnership with school staff.

We continued the Seaside PTO that held 5 successful school events for students and families (School Dance, Holiday Gift Exchange, Candy Grams, Chocolate Bar Bingo and Teacher Appreciation Week). These events helped strengthen connections and relationships between community and school.

SAC funds purchased resources that helped build classroom libraries, placed books in hands of students, provided instructional resources to teachers and outfitted rooms with tools needed to facilitate small group instruction of reading and fact fluency. Funds also helped purchase resources that provided representation of diversity, promoting a more equitable environment where students feel seen and represented.

SAC members also took part in our Seaside PTO. They volunteered in the organization, preparation, and facilitation of events at Seaside. Having the PTO also helped encourage many Seaside parents and guardians to complete their Criminal and Vulnerable Sector check and Child Abuse Registry to volunteer at PTO and other school events. Volunteerism at the school continues to increase enabling classes to take field trips and find support for other class and school events that required volunteers.

Our SAC funds were spent on resources that directly supported our action steps towards our SSP Literacy, Math and well-being goals. We purchased texts for classrooms that were of high interest and increased student engagement in reading. We purchased instructional resources to support the reading and writing instructional and assessment practice of teachers. We also purchased supplies (interactive games, Wipebooks, magnetic letters, etc.) that supported small group instruction of reading, writing and fact fluency).
